- 4. PLANT 6 NEW SPECIES OF STREET TREES ON THIS LOT (SEE THEM BELOW!)

Why the change?

- The prior street trees along 11th were spaced much tighter than typical and were all too small (and unhealthy) cherries.
- The replacement street trees are at the usual (approximate) spacing and are Urban Forestry-approved canopy trees.
- A large Red Sequoia, which is not an approved street tree due to structural damage from their root systems (and thus listed as an on-site tree here), needed to be removed from the lawn for construction.
